# A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

Many survivors come to our doors with just a bag, quickly stuffed with a few essentials, and some with terrified children, torn from their home, school, and friends. Tired and anxious about the future, their shoulders begin to relax as they are welcomed with a hot cup of coffee, dinner, toiletries, and towels on their way to one of **55 safe beds** that we have available between our **2 emergency shelters**. We help them along their path by providing **safety, advocacy, healing, and prevention**.

2022 was a year of highs and lows for victims. The increase in mass shootings, most with some connection to family violence, has rocked our community. Calls to our emergency hotline have grown by **58%** since 2019. Services for adults and children have increased by **42%** in that same time. Our shelters are overflowing into hotels. At HDNBC, children and adults tell us daily about the dangerous people in their lives – their trauma is real and intense. And yet, the opportunity to break free from an abusive relationship and build a hope-filled future is an urgent call we are answering at HDNBC.

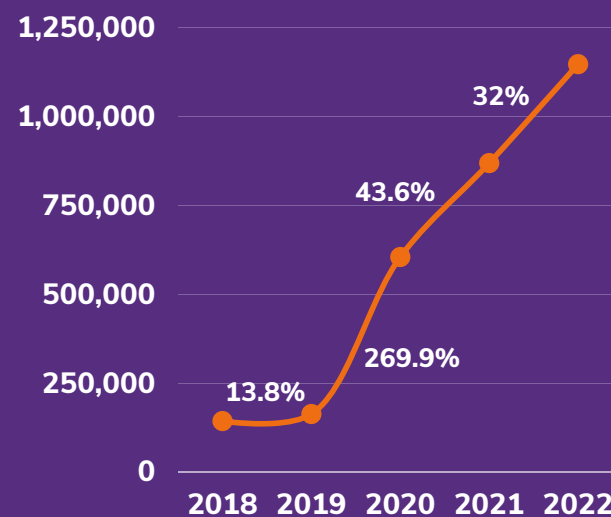

# YOUNG PROFESSIONALS

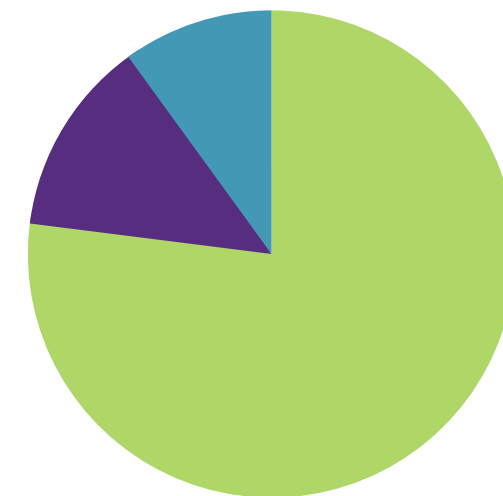

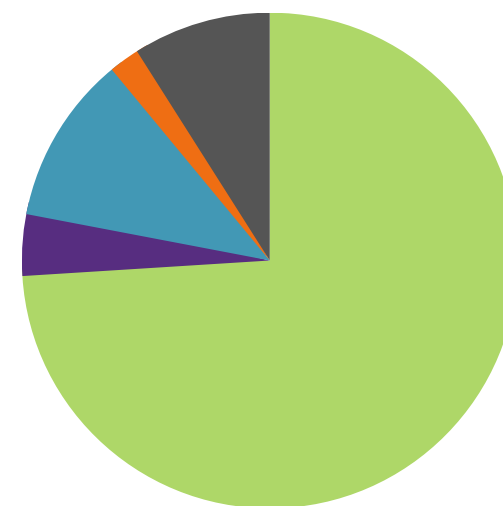
